




Image Number 1 The Sandown Depot looking northeast circa 1915.

A nineteenth century image showing the north front face of the building.





Image Number 4 The east side of the building looking west circa 1915. Note the presence of the raised loading dock and freight room sliding door.

Note roof eave bargeboard detail and what appears to be slate roof shingles and the hips capped with individual formed pieces made from either sheet metal or copper.




Image Number 7 Original roof eave and bargeboard detail This is an enlargement made from Image Number 2.




The Sandown Depot as it appeared in 1938 after the tracks had been pulled. Note that the building still appears largely intact on the exterior with original roofing and trim.
